Advanced Placement Program

- Advanced Placement (AP) is a global program created by the College Board in 1952 which offers college-level curricula and examinations to high school students.
- American colleges and universities may grant placement and course credit to students who obtain a passing score on the examinations.
- The AP curriculum for each of the various subjects is created for the College Board by a panel of experts and college-level educators in that field of study. For a high school course to have the designation, the course must be audited by the College Board to ascertain that it satisfies the AP curriculum. If the course is approved, the school may use the AP designation and the course will be publicly listed on the AP Course Ledger.
- AP Capstone Diploma is awarded to students who successfully complete six AP courses and pass the respective course exams.

Advanced Placement Program

- Broward AP Scores 2022*
 - **Total Exams: 24,353**
 - Pass Rate: 58%
 - Pre-pandemic pass rate in 2019: 59.2%

Cambridge Program

- Part of University of Cambridge
- Cambridge offers a broad and balanced study and educates the whole child. The learning process is student centered, active, inquiry based, and collaborative. It also helps develop independent study skills which universities value highly.
- Cambridge (AICE) Diploma is an internationally recognized curriculum and examination program offered at high school level.
- Cambridge is offered at all school levels. 6 ES, 16 MS, 25 HS
- Over 500 US universities accept Cambridge students including all Ivy League universities.

Cambridge AICE Program

- Comparison of Broward / National SY 2022
 - Broward
 - Total Exams: 20,270
 - Pass Rate: 77%
 - National:
 - **8** Pass Rate: 69%
 - International:
 - Pass Rate: 74%

AICE (Cambridge) Diploma Program

- Earn 7 credits
 - Pass Global Perspective and Research course and exam
 - Achieve at least one credit from each of the following groups:
 - Group 1: Mathematics and Sciences
 - Group 2: Languages
 - Group 3: Arts and Humanities
 - Group 4: Interdisciplinary subjects
- Many different course choices within each group (check with school to see what they offer)

AICE (Cambridge) Bright Future requirements

- Earn AICE Diploma prior to HS graduation with no college entrance exam requirements <u>or</u>
- AICE Curriculum 14 credits required from:
 - Core: Two credits of Global Perspective and Research required
 - Group 1: Two credits from Math/Sciences-required
 - Group 2: Two credits from Languages-required
 - Group 3: Two credits from Arts/Humanities-required
 - Group 4: Interdisciplinary Skills-optional (4 credits max)
 - Six additional credits in any combination from above subject groups
 - Minimum score required on SAT or ACT
- 75 to 100 Community Service Hours Required

International Baccalaureate Program - IB

- IB was founded in Geneva, Switzerland to prepare students for college, with a focus on creating "world citizens."
- IB Diploma is widely accepted at US and international universities.
- IB Diploma program (DP) is high school program which allows students to receive college credit for passing exams.
- IB is offered at Middle (MYP) and Elementary (PYP) levels.

International Baccalaureate – IB Diploma

- IB diploma requires six interdisciplinary courses
 - Language Arts
 - World Language
 - Social Studies
 - Science
 - Mathematics
 - Arts/Electives
- Write a research paper
- Complete 150 hours of community service

International Baccalaureate – IB Bright Futures Requirements

- Earn IB Diploma with no college entrance exam requirements or
- **Complete a minimum of 10 IB credits**
 - Two credits each in three of the following areas and one credit each in the remaining three:
 - Language Arts
 - World Language
 - Social Studies
 - Science
 - Mathematics
 - Arts/Electives
 - One credit in Theory of Knowledge
 - Complete the Creativity, Action, Service (CAS) requirement
 - Complete an extended essay
- 75 100 Voluntary Service Hours

Dual Enrollment Program - DE

- Dual enrollment is one of a number of acceleration options available that enable students to pursue a rigorous curriculum for high school graduation, as well as earn credit toward a degree or industry certification.
- Must qualify
- Grades 6-12 with a High School GPA
- Course offering restrictions
- No cost to the student

Dual Enrollment Program - DE

- BCPS has dual enrollment agreements with:
 - Broward College
 - University Of Florida
 - Florida Atlantic University
 - Florida International University
 - Embry-Riddle University

Dual Enrollment Program – Bright Futures

- What dual enrollment courses count toward a Bright Futures Scholarship?
- The Bright Futures Comprehensive Course Table (CCT) lists all courses considered for the Bright Futures state scholarships.

What's the same between these programs?

- All are rigorous college level courses
- All are eligible for Bright Future Scholarship
 - IB and AICE diploma earning students do not need college entrance exam scores to qualify.
 - IB and AICE need 100 community service hours to qualify for the highest Bright Futures Award
- All are eligible for increased quality points for GPA calculations
- All are eligible for college credit
- Florida accepts up to 45 total credit-by-exam credits.

What's different about these programs?

- IB and AICE (Cambridge) are international diploma programs.
- AP are individual courses with exams. AP has the Capstone diploma program
- Dual Enrollment are actual college courses
- Some IB and AICE have eligibility requirements for Magnet Schools
- Students must meet the minimum score on standardized assessments like the PERT/SAT/ACT to take dual enrollment courses

How do I choose the best program for my child?

- Post-Secondary Plans
 - (a) Contact the prospective post-secondary institution to determine exactly what courses/exams they accept.
 - 2) Contact the BCPS high school to determine what accelerated options they offer.
- AP/AICE/IB courses may be best option if the student is going out of state or to a preeminent post-secondary institution.
- DE courses may be the best option if the student plans to attend a Florida State University System School.
 - DE courses may not transfer to an out of state private or public post-secondary institution.
