School Advisory Forum

Purpose

1. All duties will be advisory in nature, none of which will conflict with any of the powers and duties reserved by law, policy or administrative guidelines to the principal.

2. Actively participate with the School Advisory Council in identifying the educational needs and priorities of the school.

3. Actively participate with the principal in the preparation of the budget, and reviewing the budget- related concerns after each FTE count.

4. Indicate awareness of the program and plans for the school by the signature of the chairperson on the budget when it is submitted for district budget preparation.

5. Assist in the identification and coordination of the use of community resources to improve student achievement and school effectiveness.

6. Address parent/community concerns; work with the administration to solve problems and to initiate desirable change.

School Advisory Forum

Purpose Cont'd

7. Assist in increasing/sustaining high levels of community support for the school.

8. Assist in planning, developing and implementing parent/community programs and training activities.

9. Participate in joint training opportunities with the School Advisory Council.

10. In addition to individual School Advisory Forum meetings, hold semi-annual meetings jointly with the School Advisory Council.

11. The School Advisory Forum shall use guidelines developed by the district, develop and adopt procedural bylaws, conduct meetings in accordance with the Florida Sunshine Laws, and conduct meetings according to Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised.

12. As an apolitical organization, officers and members are prohibited from using their titles and/or their positions to endorse, or give the impression of endorsing candidates for public office. In addition, public monies and/or materials may not be used to endorse candidates or further their campaigns.

School Advisory Forum


- The primary objectives of the School Advisory Council (SAC) shall be to help identify needs and recommend programs of action. Through a community-wide commitment, the team will foster a positive learning environment, which sets high expectations and meets the diverse needs of the student body.
- The School Advisory Council shall be a link between the school and the local community and will serve as a means for participatory management through which the various stakeholders in the school community may assist the school and the school may assist the community.
- The stakeholders are parents, business people, students, other community representatives, professional educators, and other school staff. The School Advisory Council shall be a resource to the school and school principal.

School Advisory Council

- The School Advisory Council shall be a resource to the school and school principal. School Advisory Council functions shall include:
 - A. To facilitate the development of the School Improvement Plan (SIP)
 - B. To monitor implementation of the SIP
 - C. To evaluate the effectiveness of the SIP
 - D. To provide assistance in the preparation of the school's annual budget (SAF Chair Signs off)
 - E. To make recommendations as to the alignment of instructional staffing and instructional materials to support the SIP
 - F. Use of School Accountability Funds
- Principal, Teachers, BTU Steward, Non-Instructional Support Employees
- Parent: I-Zone Representative, SAF Chair, ESOL Rep, ESE Rep, Gifted Rep, Pre-K Rep (parent or certified teacher)
- Students, Community/Business Representatives (required on high school & adult/technical centers—optional at the middle school)
- Community School Representative (if applicable)

Bylaws

- The Council functions shall include:
 - A. To assist in developing, identifying, and assessing the educational needs, systemic issues, and programs.
 - B. To provide a forum for information about school and community programs, advocacy, support, procedural guidelines, Education Plans (EP), procedures, school board initiatives, educational enrichment, resources, and data.
 - C. To provide suggestions for proposed legislation and tracking of new and existing federal, state, and county legislation addressing educational issues and programs.
 - D. To seek legislative support for fully funded gifted programs.
 - E. To promote and encourage parent and community involvement concerning gifted education issues and initiatives.
 - F. To promote diversity so that students who are gifted are representative of the population of Broward County Public Schools.
 - G. To implement and maintain School Board approved Gifted Advisory Council procedural bylaws and guidelines. These by-laws will follow the district by-laws template.

HOW ADVISORIES OPERATE

Bylaws

- Membership- The membership of the Gifted Advisory Council shall consist of parents, relatives, guardians, surrogates of students who are gifted, and Broward County School Board Appointees.
- Quorum- A quorum is the minimum number of members who must be present at a meeting for business to be conducted and for voting to take place. A majority of the membership of the Gifted Advisory Council Steering Committee (Executive Council) (50% plus 1) constitutes a quorum. The quorum for a general Gifted Advisory Council meeting is ten (10) members, one of whom is an officer.
- Voting Rights- Voting: When a consensus cannot be reached, a vote of the membership will be taken. All members of the Gifted Advisory Council shall have one vote each. A voting member must be present to vote.
- Elections- Officers of this Council will consist of a Chair, Vice Chairs, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Communication Chair, and Standing Committee Chair. The Parliamentarian position is appointed by the Chair and is a Non-voting member of the Steering Committee. Elected officers shall serve a period of one year or until their successors have been elected. They may be elected to that office for three consecutive terms.

HOW ADVISORIES OPERATE

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO "OPERATE IN THE SUNSHINE" ?

- Governmental Proceedings at state and local levels are subject to the Sunshine Law (Chapter 286), this includes Advisory Boards
- Meetings must be open to the public
- Public notice of meetings required
- Official minutes must be recorded
- Place of meeting must be easily accessible

ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER

- Robert's Rules of Order are guidelines on how to run a meeting
- The meeting structure according to Robert's Rules of Order is dictated by an agenda
- An agenda is a list of items to be discussed in chronological order
- Creating an agenda also protects a new item from being added once the meeting has begun and helps maintain the flow of the meeting
- Must provide an agenda and minutes

HOW Advisories Operate

MOTIONS

What is the purpose of making motions?

A motion is a formal proposal by a member to do something. Motions are the basis of the group decision-making process. They focus the group on what is being decided.

- 1. A motion is made at a meeting when a desired action is requested.
- 2. Motions typically start at a school or any advisory.

TOPIC 2

- 3. At a School Advisory Forum meeting a topic brought to the table is often discussed and a result of that discussion is formulated into a motion.
- 4. If the body votes in favor of the motion and it requires additional action, it passes to the principal or the area for consideration.
- 5. To vote at any meeting, members must sign in, present proof that they meet the voting membership requirements, if requested.


The Chair recognizes the member wanting to make a motion.

• It is suggested that the presenter put the motion in writing.


Making the Motion:

- Always state a motion affirmatively. Say, "I move that we ..." rather than, "I move that we do not ...".
- Another member will second the motion or the Chair will call for a second.
- When a second has been made the Chair will open the floor for discussion.
- An amendment can be made anytime while the motion is on the floor, the amendment must have a second to proceed.
- The amendment must be voted on first. Then the main motion.
- If there is no second to the motion, it is lost. There is no further discussion.

"Looping" has been designed for use only when a major initiative or new district wide program is under consideration

Information is presented at a District Advisory Council Meeting The information is then presented to the Area Advisories SAF Chairs

The Area Advisory Chairs provide their feedback/motion to DAC The SAF chairs return to their Area Advisory with their feedback/motion

-

SAF Chairs go back to their school and vet the information with their community

DAC brings forward a motion that is read at a School Board Meeting The motion is catalogued by the Chief of Staff and forwarded to a department for a response

A response is provided within 21 days


